"420: The Musical," 1:30 p.m. in the Manny Fried Playhouse

Like many theater pieces that pop up this time of year, John Kehoe's story about a stoner on a journey of self discovery has been part of the Infringement Festival for the past several years.

"Dazzlingly Inappropriate III: Triple Dog Dare," 2 p.m. in Rust Belt Books

"New Old and Unexpected," 3 to 5 p.m. in El Buen Amigo

I caught the first half of this program yesterday, and can't recommend it highly enough. It features the play "Graffiti Reading," inspired by graffiti on the walls of the women's bathroom in Nietzsche's, as well as the absurdist take on late capitalism "Too Big to Fail." A warning: It gets hot in the ad hoc theater in the back of the shop, so bring a fan.

Closing Ceremonies and Iffy Awards, 8 p.m. to 2 a.m. in Nietzsche's

The perfect way to end your Infringement Festival. The energy in the room during the fest's closing ceremonies is always palpable, and the distribution of the annual Iffy Awards -- featuring sometimes dubious accomplishments scrawled on paper plates -- is great fun to watch. You can also catch performances from **Able Footing**, **BloodThirsty Vegans**, **Chris Abbey**, **Bighorn Sheep**, **BlurrAngels**, **Noah Gokey & the Skulls**, the **Left Hand of Darkness** and **DJ Medison**.
