he son of an evangelical Christian preacher, the Struts frontman Luke Spiller was **drawn from gospel to glam rock** after hearing the Darkness' "flamboyant, dangerous" music.

Perhaps it's human nature, but a portion of Buffalo's event-goers seems drawn to activities with an edge, or at least a rebellious attitude, enticed by the same recklessness that appealed to Spiller. They're a healthy outlet for channeling more base desires.

This week is blessed with a few opportunities, from the Struts' in-your-face sound to the start of the 11-day Infringement Festival, which provides a platform for critical voices, even those crossing the boundary of political correctness. Then there's a slew of parties to recognize Christmas in July, such a strong dichotomy that it has to fit within this edgy premise.

The Struts, 5 to 10 p.m. Thursday, July 25 at Canalside (44 Prime St.). Cost is \$5 or \$35 for VIP; **full ticket details**.

The trajectory of English glam band the Struts is sharply on the rise: Spiller and friends served as an opener for a who's who of rock bands before rapidly earning major headlining slots, **selling them out** with regularity. Both of the band's albums – "Everybody Wants" in 2014 and "Young & Dangerous" in 2018 – have placed in the top 15 of the Billboard rock charts in the U.S.

UB Spectrum's Brenton J. Blanchet **interviewed Spiller** (who will not be eating wings) before the band's visit to Canalside; the Struts represent one of the summer's biggest bookings on the waterfront. With the Glorious Sons – who **sold out Rec**

Room well in advance this year – as the chief opener, you'll want to arrive early.

Buffalo Infringement Festival kicks off, events around the city, running through Aug. 4. Check out the **behemoth list**.

The Infringement Festival is a celebration of everything alternative, experimental and countercultural. It's partly to remove the muzzle from the PC message, partly a tribute to off-the-radar bands and artists with the intention of giving everyone a voice, as critical as some may be.

The website's mandate lends a deeper look: "Celebrating freedom of expression and designed as a real arts democracy, this festival is a critical response to the oppressive neoliberal worldview and all its billboard trucks, televisions, flyers, advertisements, jingles, made-for-TV wars; and the depoliticisation of people through this diversionary Spectacle."

Thursday's schedule is highlighted by two sets from **Brass Pro**, at the Nickel City Housing Cooperative, then Nietzsche's, with an assortment of gallery openings.
